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Plant to Attract Birds

TREES & SHRUBS to ATTRACT BIRDS:

American Elder (<i>Sambucus canadensis</i>)-berries	Mulberry (<i>Morus sp.</i>)-berries
Beautyberry (<i>Callicarpa</i>)-berries	Oak-nesting
Chionanthus virginicus (<i>Fringetree</i>)-fruit	Oregon Grape Holly (<i>Mahonia aquifolium</i>)-berries
Chokeberry (<i>Aronia arbutifolia</i>)-berries	River Birch (<i>Betula nigra</i>)-seeds
Crabapple-fruit	Roses-fruit (you must allow hips to form)
Eastern Red Cedar (<i>Juniperus virginiana</i>)-berries, cover	Serviceberry (<i>Amelanchier</i>)-berries
Firethorn (<i>Pyracantha</i>)-berries	Spruces-nesting, cones contain seeds
Hawthorn tree (<i>Crataegus</i>)-fruit	Tree & Shrub type Dogwoods-berries
Heavenly bamboo (<i>Nandina domestica</i>)-berries (some newer hybrids produce few berries, use the old-fashioned type)	Viburnums (<i>V. dentatum</i> , <i>V. triloba</i> , etc.)-berries
Highbush Blueberry-berries	White Pine-cones contain seeds
Hollies, all which produce berries (<i>Ilex sp.</i>)-berries, cover, nesting	Winterberry Holly (<i>Ilex verticillata</i>)-berries
	Wintergreen (<i>Gaultheria</i>)-berries

ANNUALS & PERENNIALS (don't deadhead to allow seeds to form)

Amaranthus	Maiden Grass (<i>Miscanthus</i>)
Bee Balm (<i>Monarda</i>)	Nasturtium
Black Eyed Susan (<i>Rudbeckia</i>)	Showy Stonecrop (<i>Sedum spectabile</i>)
Coneflower (<i>Echinacea</i>)	Sunflower
Cosmos	Zinnia
Goldenrod (<i>Solidago</i>)	

Other Ways to Attract Birds:

Plant for multiple needs-Plant trees & evergreens for nesting and cover, and berry producing trees and shrubs for food.

Provide a water source-Preferably near shrubs or trees that can provide shelter in case a predator approaches. Should be shallow (1-2") and scrubbed clean weekly.

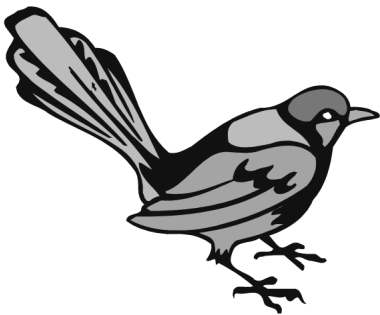
Create a brush pile-Pile storm-damaged branches into a loose pile to provide shelter.

Leave some leaves-Raked leaves into shallow piles (off the grass). Earthworms, pillbugs, insects and spiders will collect in decomposing leaf piles and attract the insect-eating birds.

Research feeders-Different birds prefer different feeder types and locations. Provide the appropriate type for the birds you'd like to attract.

Keep feeders full year 'round-Birds learn to forage where the food is readily available. Once they learn your diner is always open, they will return regularly.
